Accredited

Public, non-profit institutions accredited by the Higher Learning Commission

Cultural

Chartered by federally-recognized Tribal governments to preserve culture and language

Accessible

Accessible and affordable to both Native American and non-native students

Stable & Reliable

Established in early 1970's and are now land-grant institutions known as 1994's

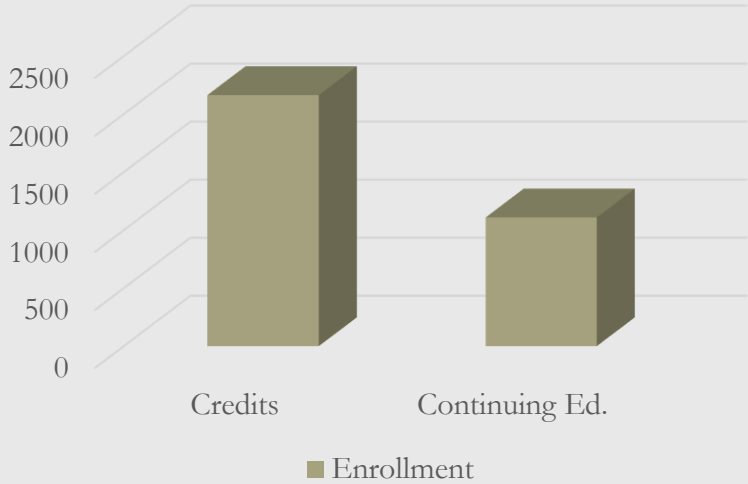

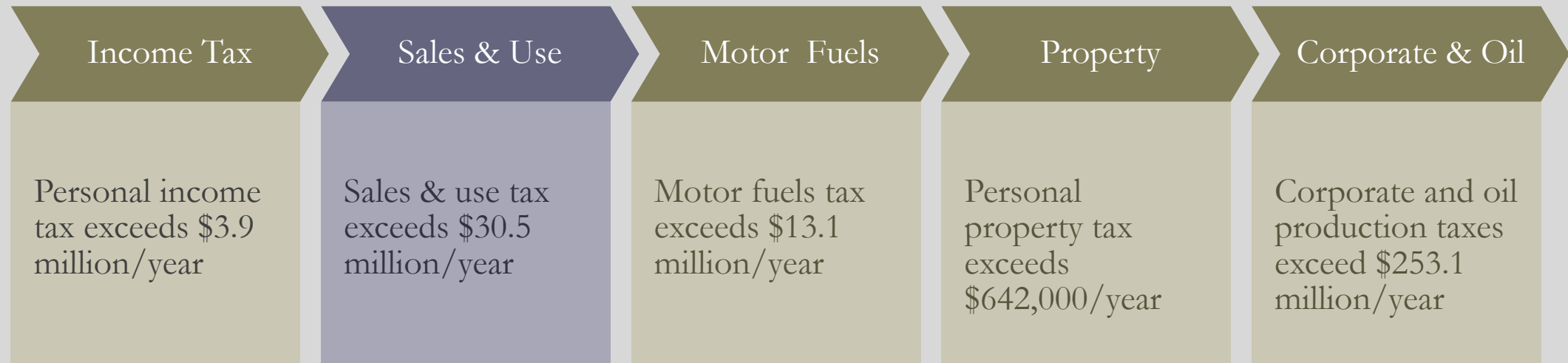


Tribal Colleges Educate Over 3,000 Students/Year

Facts & Figures

- Five (5) reservations encompass 3.8 million acres
- Tribes include Dakota, Lakota, Chippewa, Mandan, Arikara and Hidatsa
- North Dakota's largest minority population (5.25%)
- Majority (55%) reside on a reservation
- Median age is 26.9, a full 8 years younger than ND's median age of 35.1



Facts & Figures

- Native Americans account for 10.9% of the K-12 student population
- The Native American high school graduation rate averages 67.3%, compared to 88% statewide
- Poverty average rates in Benson, Rolette, and Sioux counties are more than double the U.S. poverty rate of 14%

Tribal College Assistance Grant

- Awards are based on FTE enrollment of Non-Native American North Dakotans.
- State funding per Non-Native FTE student cannot exceed the federal reimbursement rate for Native American students, currently set at \$7,356.
- No more than 50% of the biennial appropriation may be disbursed each year.

Closing Comments

- Request: Maintain \$1.0 million in non-beneficiary support under the NDUS budget for tribal colleges of North Dakota
- Tribal colleges contribute to both the local and state economies
- Tribal colleges serve both Native American and non-native ND citizens
 - 89% Native American (1,669 students enrolled in 2017)
 - 11% non-native (180 students enrolled in 2017)
